Our focus in the Behaviour Education Assemblies for the final weeks of term will be bullying.



## WA MUSEUM EXCURSION RM 14,15,16, 17 and 18

Rooms 13, 15, 16, 17 and 18 ventured to Boola Bardip (the WA Museum) in Week 7 to learn about cultural collisions to mark Reconciliation Week. All students behaved tremendously well, and learned about Australian history, historical relationships with Aboriginal peoples, and explored the museum.

On the 6 of June, 2023 room 15 went to the new museum. We went there to learn new things like Aboriginal culture, animals and other stuff.

Firstly we got there we had a quick snack. Then Tom (the person showing us around) told us about Aboriginal culture and also about how different people greet each other. Next, he took us to some more places around the museum. We filled out a work sheet and answered some questions about cultural collisions and early encounters.
